The Changes: What, Why, and How?

On October 6, faculty endorsed a set of changes to the academic program at Gustavus.

What are the changes? Why are they being made? How will it impact you?



EChange #1

How Gustavus counts credits

1 current Gustavus course = 4 credits

0.5 course = 2 credits

0.25 course = 1 credit

Reduction in zero credit courses

3 and 4 hour labs will carry 1 credit

Most 4 credit classes will meet 190-195 minutes per week

Change #1: Why

This aligns with how most colleges and universities count credits.

It's easier to understand (no more .13 credits!) and better reflects the time you spend in class. It will be easier and more straightforward to transfer credits to Gustavus.

Change #1: How

Student don't need to do anything!

The courses you've taken will automatically transition to the new system.

Students will need 128 credits to graduate.

This is equivalent to 32 of our current credits.



EEChange #2

Fewer General Education Requirements

Reducing the number of Gen Ed requirements

Expand current THEOL to Religious Studies & Philosophy
Require 1 non-English language course (102 level or higher)
Writing requirements embedded in courses
Eliminate WELBG requirement

All 100- and 200-level courses without prerequisites will carry <u>one</u> Gen Ed designation

Change #2: Why

Easier to understand what "counts" and find Gen Ed courses.

More room to explore your interests.

Easier to graduate in 4 years.

Reducing the total number of courses also reduces expenses for the College.

Change #2: How

Every course you've already taken will count toward graduation either as a Gen Ed, major requirement, or elective.

We will provide personalized help for those with questions.





Reduction in number of courses for some majors

Non-accredited majors capped at 48 credits

Requirements for externally accredited majors will remain the same

Accredited majors include:

- Education
- Professional Chemistry
- Nursing
- Public Accounting

Change #3: Why

More room to explore your interests.

Easier to graduate in 4 years.

Reducing the total number of courses also reduces expenses for the College.

Change #3: How

No majors are being eliminated through these changes.

If the requirements for your major are reduced, you will need to take fewer classes to finish your major.

For many students, major requirements will remain the same as they are now.



⊞Change #4

Creation of a Signature Experience requirement

All incoming students* will complete a Signature Experience

The Signature Experience connects academic knowledge with practical application.

Examples of a Signature Experience include:

- An internship
- A study away experience
- Collaborative research with a professor
- Certain designated classes

Students will receive a digital credential connected to the Signature Experience

All Signature Experiences will include intentional reflection on ethical thinking and justice

*Current students will not be required to complete a Signature Experience

Change #4: Why

The Signature
Experience provides a real-world opportunity for students to prepare for professional life.

Putting these experiences under the umbrella of the Signature Experience program makes it easier for students to find and register for experiential learning opportunities.

Change #4: How

Current students are encouraged to complete an internship, research project, or study away experience.

As a current student, you are not required to complete a Signature Experience.

Beginning in Fall 2024, students who complete a Signature Experience will receive a digital credential that can be listed on your resume and LinkedIn profile to illustrate your accomplishment.



:::Change #5

Academic Calendar changes

15-week semesters in the Fall and Spring

Addition of weeklong fall break Some changes to the last week of classes and finals week

Elimination of January Term

Commencement will take place in early May, creating more opportunity for students to begin summer work, internships, and research experiences

Creation of multiple summer terms (optional)

Opportunities for coursework, music tours, study away in May and June. These are not required and may result in additional costs on a per-course or per-experience basis.

Change #5: Why

Eliminating
January Term
results in budget
savings for the
College.

End of Spring term aligns with other colleges so Gusties can better access internships, research, and summer work opportunities.

No more Saturday finals.

Creates more opportunities for experiences over fall break (research, field work, service trips, etc.)

Change #5: How

This January will be the last J-Term.

Short-term study away experiences, some field experiences, and music tours will move to May, June or the week-long fall or spring breaks.



EEChange #6

Changes to when and how classes are scheduled

All classes will meet 2 or 3 times per week

No more classes that meet 4 or 5 times per week

M, W, F, classes meet for 65 minutes

T, Th, classes meet for 95 minutes

Protected time block for performing arts and athletics

With the exception of a few labs, no classes are scheduled from 3:30-5:30 p.m.

Sabbath break moves to twice a week

Sabbath will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 11:30-11:50 a.m.

Change #6: Why

Creates more consistency in how much time students spend in each class.

Alleviates scheduling conflicts between classes, which is a top academic complaint from students in our current system.

Creates the opportunity for faculty to move some things that currently take place out of class time into class meetings (e.g. group work, peer reviews, study sessions).

Change #6: How

Students will see these changes when they register for fall 2024 classes in the spring.

We'll be monitoring to ensure the new schedule alleviates scheduling conflicts.

Advising changes

Online form to declare a major or minor

Student no longer need an advisor to declare a minor

Creation of a new Advising Day each semester

There will be no classes held on one day in the Fall and one day in the Spring, so students can meet with faculty, learn about departments and programs, and work on their academic plan during a dedicated time with built-in support from professors and staff.

Change #7: Why

Makes it significantly easier to declare a major or minor.

Creates intentional space in each semester for students and faculty to focus on academic and career advising.

Change #7: How

Beginning this Spring, students can declare their major(s) and minor(s) online.

We will hold our first Advising Day on Nov. 7, 2023*. You can:

- Meet with your advisor
- Visit a department/program open house
- Attend events hosted by Career Development, CICE, and ASC.

*Fall Advising Day won't fall on an election day in future years.
